Providing Psychological Support for Disaster Survivors

- Emphasizing the provision of psychological assistance to survivors of disasters.
- Striving to extend the integration of psychological support from our organization to the individual level.
- Guaranteeing the involvement of marginalized individuals in the decisionmaking process.
- Incorporating policies and programs aimed at enhancing institutional capacity for psychological and mental support into mainstream initiatives.
- Launching efforts to cultivate a proficient workforce through training, dialogues, and discussions to cater to the needs of marginalized individuals.

Assessing Efficiency of Early Warning System in DRRM

- Improving the Early Warning System's effectiveness in covering all potentially vulnerable areas.
- > Swiftly sharing DHM's forecasts with all relevant communities.
- Prioritizing the provision of accurate forecasts to marginalized individuals facing risks.
- Utilizing weather forecast data to shape policies and measures related to Early Warning Systems.
- Strengthening the skills and capabilities of individuals involved in EWS.
- Implementing decision support systems and MHEWS systems proactively.

Private Sector Investment in Enhancing Disaster Resilience

- Encouraging private sector involvement in comprehensive DRR initiatives.
- Prioritizing the inclusion of vulnerable individuals within the private sector in decision-making related to DRR.
- Integrating proactive engagement of the private sector on the developing DRR-related policies.
- Dedication to facilitating inclusive dialogues for policy and program development in the realm of DRR.

Good Governance for DRRM Across Three Tiers of Government

- Establishing clear definitions of roles and responsibilities for the three tiers of government in DRRM.
- Assigning governmental roles and responsibilities according to the scale and impact of disasters.
- Prioritizing the inclusion of vulnerable populations residing in high-risk areas within the decision-making process of DRRM.
- Ensuring the utilization of existing infrastructure and trained personnel for integrated emergency services during disasters.
- Delegating specific responsibilities to the relevant District Coordination Committee to oversee DRRM coordination.
- Periodically assess and adjust the DRR National Policy and National Strategic Plan of Action to meet evolving needs.

Enhancing the Resilience of Market Systems in DRR

- Collaborative disaster planning for market impact.
- Assessing disaster risks for market stability.
- Raising private sector awareness of high-risk areas and market dynamics.
- Promoting government policies for market resilience.
- Partnering with public and private entities for market strengthening.
- Educating and monitoring market conditions.
- Continuous improvement through experiential learning.

Improving Disaster Risk Transfer & Financing Mechanisms

- The utilization of funds dedicated to disaster management.
- Promoting awareness and education regarding insurance.
- Expanding the reach of insurance services to rural regions.
- Fostering government commitment to insurance policies.
- Investigating alternative approaches to risk transfer.
- > Enhancing the oversight and regulation of the insurance industry.
- Streamlining insurance programs for simplicity.
- Implementing comprehensive policies for managing disasters throughout their cycles.

Involving Non-Governmental Stakeholders in DRRM Efforts

- Continuing to share valuable knowledge and wisdom gained from the NRA.
- > Annually release the Nepal Disaster Report, incorporating inputs from NGSs.
- Review and amend the guidelines regarding NGSs involvement.
- > Clearly define the duties and obligations of the three levels of government.
- Create a DRR policy monitoring system to prevent jurisdictional inconsistencies.
- Enhance the NPDRR program and extend its reach to provincial and local levels.
- Promote the widespread utilization of the Central DM Fund for DRR, Response, and Recovery efforts.
- > Foster a collaborative atmosphere for NGSs to collaborate effectively.

Key Issues

- Provisional: Lack of provisions and having few policy dilemmas.
- Institutional: Very few/non representatives at the councils, committees and institutional decision support system.
- Operational:
 - Lack of delineation within three tiers of government.
 - Local Administration Vs Local Governments
 - Limited scope of DM Fund mobilization
- Behaviors: Hesitation to working together with Non-Governmental Stakeholders.

Way forward

- Formulate policy provisions as required.
- Avoid jurisdictional zig zag.
- Delineate of powers between three tiers of government.
- Mobilize DM Fund for DRR, Response, RRR.
- Develop a system of situation tracking, monitoring, and getting feedback.
- Promote a culture of working together among government, nongovernment, private sector for DRRM.
