NPP Highlights

Established multi-stakeholder country partnership to enhance coordination

Established linkages between the private sector and local chambers of commerce and industries with NDR net for resource mobilization and effective coordination

Strengthened inter-governmental coordination and information exchange National Emergency Operation Center – Health Emergency Operation Center (NEOC-HEOC) by integrating health data in the BIPAD portal

Cultivated private sector understanding of disaster risk reduction (DRR) and engagement in disaster preparedness and response through joint initiatives with other key stakeholders

Developed a pool of local organization members in most disaster-prone districts for immediate disaster/emergency response Improved private sector capacity in disaster preparedness and response through business continuity management orientations

Institutionalized protection against lightning (PaL) by incorporating into Tribhuvan University curriculum and Department of Urban Development and Building Construction (DUDBC) building code

Scaled up learning and knowledge amongst local networks through access to Core Humanitarian Standards (CHS), Framework for Integrating Rights and Equality (FIRE), PaL, and BCM in local languages

Strengthened capacity of the local authorities through development of Local Disaster and Climate Resilience Plans (LDCRP)

Mobilized local government funding to conduct trainings for staff on DRM
